Dear Parents

In last week's newsletter I shared with you my reflections on Leadership and the involvement of our Year 5 students in the process of Leadership at St Patrick's.

This week my thoughts take me back to my recent visit to Rome, particularly the audience with our Holy Father, Pope Francis, leader of the Catholic Church, at St Peter's Square. For those who have not had the blessing of experiencing a visit to the Vatican it is truly one to look forward to. Keenly anticipated, our coach of pilgrims prepared for this excursion by leaving our hotel very early in the morning. We were soon joined by thousands of pilgrims, young and old, from all over the world waving flags and streamers. Once past security we quickly found our seats in the booked area and settled in for a long but worthwhile wait. There was something truly wonderful when you realize that you are indeed part of a world community of faithful people who share a belief like ours - our Catholic faith. Some of the people next to us were from other parts of Italy and although I could not speak or understand Italian and they could not understand English we tried to communicate as much as we could about the excitement we felt awaiting the arrival of this great man. The atmosphere was indescribable in that it was like a rock concert filled with the sounds of cheers and chants and that of pilgrims gathered saying the rosary. On his arrival the square lifted with the roar of elation and it was at that point we realized that Pope Francis would be travelling around and amongst the people, on top of his 'Pope Mobile'. Now and then he would stop to speak to someone or to lift and bless a baby. People rushed to the barrier fences just to catch a closer glimpse of him, stretching out their hands and calling out his name. All the while he waved and smiled with an expression of genuine care and enjoyment at being amongst

But what is it about this leader that has renewed the Church in a way that has not been seen to this intensity before. I think the reason this man has had such an impact in such a short time, is that Pope Francis seems to hold his love of people above and beyond all other things. Many stories are told of when Pope Francis has gone out of his way to ensure that others are treated with respect and dignity; the time he asked his driver to stop at the side of the road to give a blessing to a sick child on a bed which had been wheeled out by his family, is but one example of the way he shows God's love in a very human and real way. The saying, "Actions speak louder than words" is one of my favourite sayings and Pope Francis is a leader that epitomizes this sentiment. In striving to be like such a leader one may get the impression that it demands perfection however perfection is both unrealistic and lacks humanness. I think it is authenticity that Pope Francis demonstrates, integrity in a very inclusive and compassionate way.

As we head toward the end of the year, let us think and pray for all who find themselves in leadership for 2015, especially for newly appointed Archbishop Anthony; that they may be wise and considerate of all people and that they may demonstrate the same love and dignity Our Lord Jesus Christ taught through His ministry.

POPE FRANCIS' ADDRESS

The following is a summary of the Holy Father's words on the morning of our visit:

Dear Brothers and Sisters.

In our catechesis on the church, we now consider our fellow Christians who belong to other traditions. Divisions between Christ's followers are clearly contrary to His will as expressed in his prayer to the Father that all might be one so that the world might believe. Christ desires us to be united in His love and in communion with one an other, yet throughout history the church has experienced temptations against this unity leading to tragic divisions. We must not be resigned to these divisions but must join our prayer to that of Jesus in imploring among all His followers, constant openness to dialogue and appreciation of the gifts of others. In loving the Lord and sharing the riches of His love, we will better see what unites us rather than what separates us. By dwelling in the truth and practising forgiveness and charity we will be evermore conformed to Christ's will, reconciled with one another and led closer to the goal of full unity which he wills for all his disciples.

School Banking for Term 4

Student banking will cease for 2014 in week 10. Tuesday 9th December will be the final day for banking for 2014. Student banking will commence again Term 1, Week 2, 2015.

Start of School for 2015

Can you believe we are already talking about next year when we haven't even finished 2014. Such is life! Next year there will be a slight change to the start of the school year with students from Years 1 to 6 officially starting on **Thursday 29th January 2015**.

In order to begin the teaching and learning year successfully, it is vital that teachers have the most current data on each student to be able to cater for the specific needs of each child in numeracy. To assist with this data collecting the teachers will be conducting individual Maths Assessments over two days: **Tuesday 27**th **and Wednesday 28**th **January**. You will be asked to book a time online at a later date. Details will be sent home with reports.

Interviews will be scheduled each half hour and you will be required to nominate times that suit you. As each teacher will be doing interviews with their own class families should be able to arrange to have siblings do their interviews around the same time.

We look forward to your continued support as we trial the new online booking system and assessment process, which is a Parramatta Diocesan requirement for all schools. By having the interviews before the children start it will minimise disruption in the first weeks of school.

Religious Literacy Assessment in 2014.


This week all students in Years 4 & 6 received the results of their Religious Literacy Assessment. As part of a Parramatta Diocesan wide assessment of religious literacy, all Year 4 & 6 students completed an online assessment which related to their learning in Religious Education up to and including 2014.

In addition to the Part A Online Test, Year 4 students chose how they would demonstrate their learning in relation to the *Sharing Our Story* unit, 24C9 Reconciliation: God's Forgiveness and Healing as they undertook the Part B Extended Task. The Part B Task was marked by teachers at St Patrick's.

The Religious Literacy Assessment is just one form of assessment in Religious Education. There are many forms of school-based assessment in Religious Education that take place across the school year.

We continue to delight in the goodness and faith of all our children. Together, we are dedicated to their learning, their wellbeing and their continued growth and development as people made in the image and likeness of God.


