



Dear Parents and Caregivers,

OF CATHOLIC EDUCATION IN THE DIOLOGY OF PARRAMATTA

Over the last few weeks the children from Kindergarten to Year 5 had the opportunity to vote for the Student Representative Council members (SRC) for their class, for Semester 2. This is an opportunity for children to nominate and then vote for children, from their class, they wish to represent their class this semester. On some occasions I am asked about the equity of children being selected a number of times or the selection of those that are new members to our community. Over the years we have refined the process to allow a greater number of students to attain the position, whilst still ensuring that we are respectful of student voice and choice.

The children decide as to whom they wish to represent their class and no adult makes any contribution to this process besides the organisation and counting of votes. (the only exception to this is Semester One Kindergarten) We trust them to choose children that they are confident in and those they believe will represent them proudly and respectfully. Of course we encourage children to look at others through the lense that everyone has the potential to lead and we do this in the spirit of encouraging and supporting the strengths of others. It is wonderful to see how keen children are in recognising the gifts of others and in encouraging leadership in their classmates.

Student Voice is very important at St Patrick's Parramatta and we are continuing to work towards more student involvement as the years progress. Some of the principles guiding our work in this area include:

- A belief that **All** children have a right to have a voice
- Children can learn to work together to improve school life and contribute student ideas
- All children can develop their individual capacity to lead and influence others in a responsible manner.
- Leadership is about service to the community
- Children can learn to make a positive difference in their community but there is a difference between popularity and effective leadership.
- A good student leadership program begins in Kindergarten

Children who have a desire for leadership and who have not yet had the opportunity must not lose heart. This desire will most likely be fulfilled some time in their lives. It just may not be their time yet. I encourage them to look to other children and to learn from them. I encourage them to continue to support them and to recognise that they too have a very important part to play by virtue of being part of our school community. I encourage them to know that they are valued and that their voice will be heard through the children they have chosen, especially through the use of the suggestion box made available in their classrooms. There are many of you - leaders in your workplaces and in your own communities - that did not take on leadership positions as young boys or girls. This did not mean that leadership skills were not fostered in other ways and that leadership was not to be part of your lives.

In saying this the school is committed to being fair and to demonstrate best practice and will continue to monitor and review our processes each semester.

The badges for Semester 1 Student Representatives will be presented tomorrow, commencing at 2.00pm, Unfortunately due to COVID restrictions still impacting schools we are unable to invite visitors. Photos and video will be taken and shared with the school community





From 'The Learning Pit'



Recently I heard a discussion on the Today show around parents not commenting to their little girls about being 'pretty' or 'beautiful'. All the people involved in the discussion disagreed with the points presented and expressed how they regularly refer to their children as beautiful and do not see any harm in such comments. It caused me to pause and reflect on how as a parent and educator I have developed my own appreciation and understanding of the different types of compliments given to children as they grow.

The research and teachings from Carol Dweck regarding Growth Mindset has helped my understanding evolve and has highlighted the importance of guiding all children to focus on how they are improving. This also helps students build resilience which is vital for all people so they can cope with difficult times and see how they can learn and grow through these times.

Mary Cay Ricci author of *Mindsets in the Classroom: Building a Culture of Success and Student Achievement in Schools* suggests the following:

- **Use growth mindset praises.** Praise the willingness to try, effort, patience and practice. Do not attribute success to "being smart" or "being the best."
- **Model flexibility.** Children aren't born thinking flexibly. Try modelling how to handle challenging situations by keeping calm and not becoming frustrated.
- Adopt a "glass half full" mentality at home. Model a positive attitude when facing challenges as this shows your child that setbacks or mistakes help us grow.
- Help children find topics or areas they enjoy. Encourage your child to try new things as this will help them find areas they thrive in.

As Carol Dweck says, "If parents want to give their children a gift, the best thing they can do is to teach their children to love challenges, be intrigued by mistakes, enjoy effort, and keep on learning. That way, their children don't have to be slaves of praise. They will have a lifelong way to build and repair their own confidence".

At times I still say to my own children they are 'beautiful' but also balance it with compliments about their learning and how proud I am about the effort they put into different tasks.

Let's work together this year and help all the students at St Patrick's to become lifelong learners who see the importance of making mistakes and learning from them.
